

kids interviewed people who were attending the Chanukah Bazaar. The question was something like, "What do you like best about Judaism?" Or "Why are you Jewish?" The number one answer was "The food!" The second answer was "Community."

There is no question that food is important in Judaism. Much of our religion is based in the home celebrating holidays and Shabbat. Many of our traditions revolve around food. Apples and honey, latkes, hamantaschen, matzah ball soup. Each holiday has its flavor. And there are great debates. Apple sauce or sour cream? Fluffy or sinker matzah balls? Latkes or hamantaschen? And if you are from a Jewish culture other than Ashkenazi, you might be more familiar with dishes that include dates, figs, pomegranates, honey, bulgar, chickpeas. That's great. Those tastes and recipes enrich us all.

The Torah has much to say about how we eat. We know the basics. No pork or shellfish. No mixing milk and meat. The whole system is called keeping

kosher, or kashrut. It is an authentic way to be Jewish. To do Jewish.

Much has been said about why G-d commanded that we shouldn't eat pork or shellfish. One thought is that like observing Shabbat and putting up a mezuzah, it differentiates us from the surrounding cultures. Keeping kosher made it difficult to eat with our neighbors. It separates us. But the root of the word "kadosh," holy, is separate. So that might be a good thing. These days it doesn't have to keep us separate. We can find kosher food everywhere, without even leaving the Fox River Valley. It can, however, increase our holiness and draw us closer to the Divine. If we think about these rules every meal, then we are aware that there is something bigger than ourselves. For me, that's holiness.

Here at CKI we have a kosher kitchen. We use kosher meat, kosher cheese, kosher wine. We separate meat from milk. Everything needs to have a hekhsher, a label, certifying that it is kosher. I have the responsibility of assuring the kashrut of the kitchen. It's really not hard, but some people are intimidated by all the rules. If you have a question, please ask.

Later this month, on May 19th at 11 AM we will have the opportunity to participate in a unique debate. Is Meat Eating or Veganism the more authentic Judaism? Rabbi Shmuly Yanklowitz and I will debate this on Zoom. Mayim Bialik describes Rabbi Shmuly this way: "A young hip well-dressed down-to-earth Modern Orthodox rabbi and teacher with connections in so many areas; he is a

really brilliant and inspiring guy." She is correct. He is brilliant. A great writer, author of several books, and one of the most compassionate guys I know. He is a vegan, and he sees this as an essential part of his Judaism.

I will need your help. Feed me your best arguments as to why Jews can eat meat as an authentic expression. (If you are a vegan, feed me those arguments too!) Then show up on Zoom on May 19 and vote for the best debater. A donor from Rabbi Shmuly's organization is granting the winning team a \$5,000 prize. Whatever happens, this will be a fun morning with much to learn about why food might just be the most important expression of Judaism in our community.

For Cardio Health, Self Care Is More Important Than Ever

Since October 7, stress levels in Israel and for Jews around the world have been understandably high. That's why it's all the more important to focus on self care, says Dr. Donna Zfat-Zwas, MD, MPH, director of the Linda Joy Pollin Cardiovascular Wellness Center for Women at Hadassah Hospital Ein Kerem.

"One of the important things that



we've learned during this time is many of us have felt guilty about taking care of ourselves. How can I go and do something nice for myself when

they're fighting a battle?" Dr. Zfat-Zwas said. "What we've learned is we have to do these things. We have to be kind to ourselves, so that we can keep on going and give the support, be there for our children, for our significant others, for our parents and for the greater community."

To this end, the Pollin Center has made it one of its core missions to care for the caretakers, "For what we call the 'sheroes,'" Dr. Zfat-Zwas said.

That includes women who are taking care of their kids by themselves while their spouses are fighting in Gaza, grandmothers who are taking care of their grandchildren, so that their daughters can work while their husbands are fighting in Gaza, and

caretakers at all levels.

"All these people also need to be caring for themselves," she said. "It's overwhelming, but at the same time that we're running around, we need to do the things for our own self to maintain our health, from eating right to exercising to finding out the ways that we can reduce our stress."

While heart disease is the number one killer worldwide of both men and women, symptoms present themselves differently in women than in men, and women are often underdiagnosed and undertreated.

Rabbi Margaret and I try to create Jewish memories of Torah School. We try to create experiences that leave long-lasting, positive Jewish memories. Our memories from this year started outside. We began the school year at CKI Rosh Hashanah Prep in August. There were apples, honey, a presentation about the importance of bees, and a teacher performance of an Earl parody to "Love and Marriage."

Next there were baking round challahs, Sukkot, and Simchat Torah! There were apple stories, games, creating storms, and inviting guests from MCJC. There were children's activities as well as Tashlich and shofar blowing.

Thanksgiving came, and we went to Jewel to see if we could plan, budget, and buy a family Thanksgiving feast. Everything purchased was then donated to the Community Crisis Center!

May 5th will be our last day of Torah School for the school year! New this year was First Friday Family Shabbats. The first Friday of every month was family Shabbat at CKI. There were stories told, challah eaten, and friendships made. We can't wait to continue next year with more memories!




